Windrush Day marks the anniversary of the arrival of the ship Empire Windrush at the Port of Tilbury, near London, on 21 June 1948. However, passengers disembarked a day later 22 June 1948 – hence why this has come to be known as Windrush Day.

WINDRUSH FACTS!

Empire Windrush, originally the Monte Rosa, was a passenger liner and cruise ship launched in Germany in 1930. During World War II she was operated by the German navy as a troopship.

WINDRUSH

The name Windrush, as a result, come to be used as shorthand for West Indian migration, and by extension for the beginning of modern British multiracial society. The purpose of Windrush's voyage had been to transport service personnel.

WHY DID THE CARIBBEANS COME TO BRITAIN?

They hoped for better opportunities for themselves and their children. Some came to work for a while, save money and return to the Caribbean. There was no shortage of jobs in industries such as National Rail and the NHS, and public transport recruited almost exclusively from Jamaica and Barbados.



WHY IS WINDRUSH CELEBRATED?

Windrush Day celebrates the diversity people brought with them to the UK and recognises the contribution they made to British society, culture and economy.

WHEN DID THEY ARRIVE IN BRITAIN?

The ship Empire Windrush arrived at the Port of Tilbury on 21 June 1948 and its passengers disembarked a day later. The ship carried 492 Caribbean migrants, many of them veterans of the Second World War.

WHERE DID THE WINDRUSH GENERATION COME FROM?

The Windrush Generation denotes the people who emigrated from the Caribbean to Britain between the arrival of the Empire Windrush on 22 June 1948 and the Immigration Act 1971, including the passengers on the first ship.

WHAT WAS THE WINDRUSH SCANDAL?

The Windrush story became a scandal in 2018. Windrush generation individuals were wrongly detained, denied legal rights, threatened with deportation, and in at least 83 cases wrongly deported from the UK by the Home Office. It was later found out that the Home Office discarded important documents which were later needed by these people to prove they had arrived in Britain legally.




Beowulf

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
