YEAR 10 UCL TRIP

On Thursday 6th July, Year 10 students were lucky enough to go on a special guided tour at UCL, culminating in an interactive Q&A session with UCL students and even a UCL professor!

Woodsiders started their tour by the iconic Portico building in the main campus. It was an incredible place to start as students from the Faculty of Brain Sciences at UCL were graduating at the time, and we were able to see so many new graduates, in their caps and gowns, celebrating with their families, taking photographs and marking the end of their degrees. We saw groups of UCL graduates looking so joyful and taking photos by the displays that we clapped and congratulated them on their achievement. When it was our turn to take a group photo, they clapped and cheered us too! It was so nice to see how warm and friendly UCL students are.

We broke into two groups and went on a tour of UCL buildings – well, a lot of UCL building, but not all of them, because we discovered how huge UCL is!!! In fact, UCL is about the size of 46 Woodsides, which is massive! We had two wonderful tour guides, Patricia and Jabiah, Woodside Alumni and current LAE students, who lead us on a really interesting and interactive tour. We discovered that there are degrees available that we had never heard of and that there are 28 different engineering degrees on offer! We learnt about Anthropology, how many Nobel Prize winners there are from UCL (29!) and that there are 18 libraries at UCL! Patricia and Jabiah made the tour really engaging and gave us lots of opportunities to ask questions and learn more. We even got to see what student accommodation looked like!

We learnt about this history of UCL and how it was founded in part by a philosopher called Jeremy Bentham, who was a really interesting man, but a bit quirky. We got to meet him, in the form of his auto icon in the Student Centre, which is definitely not an experience we will ever forget!

Our tour of the campus ended in the Maths department, where we were joined by two current Year One students at UCL, Veronica and Fraser. We were able to ask them all kinds of questions, from what made them choose to study Maths to what it was like in student accommodation. They were so kind and helpful, answering our many, many questions in such a friendly way! It was very reassuring to learn that they had the same worries about university life that we have.

We were then fortunate enough to meet Dr Kalaydzhieva, Lecturer in Mathematics at UCL. Dr Kalaydzhieva was incredibly kind to us and told us about her journey to get her PHD and become a lecturer at one of the most prestigious universities in the world (UCL is currently ranked 8th in the WORLD!). It was so inspiring to hear from Dr Kalaydzhieva who navigated some challenges and set backs that we could all relate to. She spoke to us so honestly and openly and gave us hope to not be deterred by initial disappointments that we might face. We got to ask her lots and lots of questions, and we even asked her "what is the future of maths". We were stunned when she said "you are"! Dr Kalaydzhieva was so lovely to us it made us want to start university straight away! Huge thanks to everyone who helped make this memorable trip happen.

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
