WOODSIDE WOMEN AT BLACK GIRL FEST!



You must have heard the term BLACK GIRL MAGIC? Many have heard it and wonder what exactly it means, some have even wondered whether it's offensive. It's certainly not a term that you will find in the dictionary. So just to make sure that we are all on the same page, the term was created by CaShawn Thompson to celebrate the beauty, power and resilience of black women. The hashtag #BlackGirlMagic immediately took over social media platforms, with Essence and Teen Vogue magazines dedicating a number of their front covers to the phenomenon.

If you want a dictionary style definition, we'd say: Black Girl Magic is a term used to illustrate the universal awesomeness of black females. It's about celebrating anything that is unique, amazing, awesome, sometimes gravity-defying and even mind-blowing about ourselves.

Woodside High School is an enchanted place where diversity is celebrated. Our core values are underpinned by the outrageous notion that our differences are our strengths and actually what make us so fabulous. It is for this reason

that our staff and students are so freely able to celebrate some of society's most marginalised groups, free from the pressure to conform. The theme of this year's Black Girl Fest was 'taking up space'; seeking to champion inclusivity across various industries and break down barriers to create new seats at the table. The Black Girl Fest is an annual one -day festival aimed to facilitate the growth of Black women and girls. On the day

there were carefully curated talks, workshops and film screenings alongside a marketplace, and live performances.

Paula Akpan is the Founding director of Black Girl Fest and once said of the Black Girl Fest "We wanted to create something we wished we had for our younger selves". Twenty of our girls attended the Black Girl Fest 2019 and were able to immerse themselves in a day dedicated to them. Some found out the true meanings of their names, participated in seminars and spoke to inspiring women of colour; challenging some of the societal stereotypes of the role of the black woman in the workplace. Some purchased hair products, cultural attire and discussed beauty ideals that often dictate many of the decisions made by teenage girls who are struggling to carve out an identify for themselves. It was a culturally enriching and uplifting day for the students and staff who attended. We look forward to next year!



STAFF & STUDENTS SHOW RACISM THE RED CARD!

Freezing cold but in high spirits, staff and students attended the re-arranged Haringey Borough's FA Cup tie to Yeovil Town on Tuesday 29th October. The original match was abandoned 10 days earlier due to allegations that racist abuse was directed at Haringey players from the Yeovil supporters section.

Police are continuing to investigate the allegations of racism at the first game but the FA's decision to replay the game allowed fans the opportunity to come out in support of the local team and promote our Shared Values of respect, embracing diversity and celebrating differences.

Despite the increasingly bitter weather, there was real warmth and positivity amongst the crowds which was enhanced further by Ms Ikoloh, who not only provided half-time refreshments but led chants of 'We are Haringey! We are Haringey!' throughout. Earlier in the week, students had dedicated time to creating their own banners proclaiming 'Stop Racism Now' and 'Show Racism the Red Card' which they proudly and enthusiastically waved as they cheered Haringey on.

Woodside were not the only supporters determined to challenge the alleged racism of the last match. In all, a crowd of around 1000 people attended, with many carrying banners such as 'One Game One Community' and proudly wearing 'Stamp Out Racism' badges.

Fortunately, there were no further incidents of racist abuse and despite a disappointing 3-0 defeat to Yeovil, the support from the crowd ensured there was plenty of positive energy and a great night was had by all.

SPEAKING THE TRUTH ABOUT BLACK HISTORY

Year 7 and 8 were lucky enough to participate in spoken word sessions to celebrate Black History Month with spoken word artist Bad Lay-Dee. Students explored music and beats indicative of black history in Britain. They then thought of things which were of importance to them and arranged these thoughts into bars of four beats per line. Bad Lay-Dee played a series of different rhythms and students

experimented with matching their ideas to the beat. The outcome was fantastic and some students who had never performed before shared their talents with their tutor group. 





WOODSIDE CELEBRATES
























SHOW RACISM THE RED CARD

As the second in a group of workshops over the course of the year, students were keen to start the session and enthusiastically took part in activities designed to develop listening skills and promote team work. With tasks such as 'building' a car using just themselves and seeing how long they could successfully follow contradictory instructions ('When I say 'clap', you jump!'), Deep Black's innovative approach to exploring emotional wellbeing allowed students to express their feelings in a safe, dynamic and creative environment.













TREMENDOUS TEAMWORK

AT TOLMERS!

Woodside's Year 7 team had an exciting start to the term as we all took a trip to Tolmers activity centre. The day got off to a great start, the sun was shining and the students were eager to get involved in all the challenges. 7A were first on the climbing wall and were quick to demonstrate Woodside values- the students were great at cheering each other on as they scaled the wall. 7Q had the opportunity to battle it out on the gladiator activity, it got particularly heated when Kasharn 'The King' Campbell went up against Micah 'Ghosthunter' Lynch.

The students were eager to show off their basketball skills in Aeroball, where they had to try and shoot while also jumping on the trampolines, which really tested the students endurance! Again the students did a fantastic job of supporting each other, in some games, students were

able to score over 10 baskets! The bungee run was so fun, you could hear the laughter from far away as the students watched each other run as fast and hard as possible to see who could reach the furthest before being pulled back by the bungee. Students were very impressed with how far Ms Zahajkewicz could reach!

A highlight of the day was when the students got to work on the team challenges, where resilience was key. Students had to use their communication skills as they tackled different tasks in teams of 4. Particularly noteworthy was Ahmet's group from 7E, who did not give up on the task of using planks and baskets to reach from one side of the field to the other. After 6 attempts, there was a huge cheer as they made it just in time to get the coach back to school. We were so pleased to be able to take the whole year group out into the fresh air for lots of new experiences and some great team work. The students really made us proud!

WOODSIDE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS' EXCELLENT ACHIEVEMENTS

Woodside High School students have achieved strong results in this year's GCSE examinations with 67% of students achieving 5 GCSEs at grades 4+ including English and Maths (an increase of 12% on last year) and 35% at grades 5+ including English and Maths. 20% of all exams taken achieved the top grades of 7, 8 or 9 and 86% of students achieved a grade 4+ in English.

Exceptional results include those by Edson Cardoso, (5 grade 9s, 1 grade 7 and 1 grade 6), Nazifa Uddin (4 grade 9s, 3 grade 8s, 1 grade 7 and 2 grade 6s), Aleksandra Piperkova (4 grade 9s, 3 grade 8s, 1 grade 7, 1 grade 6) and Maahin Mukith, (3 grade 9s, 4 grade 8s and 2 grade 7s).

With over 51% of the year group achieving the very top grades (grade 7+) in a minimum of one of their examinations, Woodside students have once again demonstrated why, in its most recent inspection by OFSTED, Woodside High was judged to be outstanding.

We were really thrilled to host a visit from Jessy Nkhoma, 18 and Isaac Mzembe, 17, from Malawi

this term. Jessy and Isaac are the Head Girl and Head Boy at a secondary school in Kasungu, Malawi, and were chosen to come to the UK, along with their Head, to talk about education and climate change. They are urging the UK Government to take action against global warming and reduce CO2 emissions before it is too late.

Climate change has meant people in Malawi are dealing with more frequent flooding and droughts, both of which Jessy and Isaac have experienced themselves. This has impacted upon their lives directly and prevented them and

their peers from being able to go to school as well as their families experiencing many difficulties. It was really powerful for students to hear from Jessy and Isaac about how climate change has impacted their lives and learn more about what we can do to help mitigate climate change and the current climate crisis. Right now, climate change is devastating lives. We have a chance to limit the damage from this crisis, but time is running out - we need people to take urgent action now.


NEVER TOO COOL FOR SCHOOL! ELECTOR

Year 9 students from 'The Real World' elective participated in the Money Sense Workshop led by Ms. Jay-Treasure who was supported by three volunteers from Natwest and other subsidiaries from the RBS banking group.

Working in teams, students discussed and explored; what they valued in a mobile phone, what people use phones for and where/how they could find information to make an informed decision when choosing a new phone or price plan. A good camera, apps, user interface, touchscreen and Wi-Fi



accessibility were rated highly in comparison to overall cost. There was much debate over whether Apple or Samsung phones were of better quality!

Students were then given teenaged character profiles and a selection of price plans which they matched, based on the requirements of their character. Working under timed conditions with the help of the volunteers and Ms. Jay-Treasure, students gathered their





calculations, findings and opinions which were then presented to the rest of the group.

At the end of and throughout the session, students were able to ask the Natwest volunteers about their roles within banking which included a Community Ambassador and a Project Manager. Eager students asked about how to get into banking and the appropriate educational steps to take to reach a similar position.

The workshop also gave students an insight into the realities (and dangers) of mobile phone contracts and the importance of researching, calculating and comparing different price plans and phones before committing: real skills for the real world!

Keen to take on a challenge, our Year 9 Journalism Elective students are taking part in the BBC Young Reporter scheme where they will be producing their own news stories and may have the opportunity to have them developed and broadcast on the BBC. There is no stopping them!

This term our Year 10 Business students were treated to an insight into how Lush make their famous and award-winning products.

Students received a personalised

tour of the shop and discussed the use of different ingredients and the science behind the process. They also learnt about how Lush work to try to create ethically sourced, environmentally responsibly and

fairly traded products - something that is a core part of their business model.

Students also learnt about vegan products, being animal cruelty free and other ethical practices. Lush use fresh ingredients in their products and make sure that they do not cause harm to the environment. Glitters, for example, contain PET or microplastics, which end up in the ocean and cause significant harm to marine wildlife as they do not break down. Lush now use synthetic mica made up of natural minerals so they do not have a negative impact on the environment.

All in all our students had a fantastic time and learnt a great deal about business. Well done to all for an enriching and educational




Art History students inspired at the Victoria & Albert Museum?

They were fascinated to hear how the exhibition came about and how many local artists had contributed to the exhibition.

It was great to see Woodside Art students explore art pieces in more depth after one of the artists explained the different works. Our students thoroughly enjoyed being able to ask questions and increased their knowledge and understanding. Students learnt about Seaman William Brown, who worked in the Navy disguised as a man. They loved the different installations whether it was looking at the display of photos, embroidery work, watching a video of slides about the BAME women or listening to a story through pipes. Woodside Art students really enjoyed the interactive video booth as it allowed them to creatively give feedback on their experience of the exhibition.













Year 9 students from 'The Real World' elective visited Freightliners City Farm this term. On arrival, students were greeted by the honking of a very large goose which startled staff and students alike! Students, alongside Ms. Diamond and Ms. Jay-Treasure where given an introduction to the farm by their guide, Peter who informed the group about the

conception of the city farm and its purpose to reunite city dwellers with nature and sustainable living: Peter also explained to the assembled group that the farm was vegetarian and used animal waste to help grow produce like rocket that was sold and cooked in the farm's cafe.



Students were then given a tour of the farm and the opportunity to feed the goats and pigs. Students also met with sheep, cows, chickens and rabbits - all of which were very friendly and in some cases too friendly as they tried to chew clothing and hair! Dicle, Deniz and Jamie were particular keen to feed the animals and inspired others to have a go. The pigs were extremely noisy and Peter was difficult to hear over the din, as they were waiting for their food and were incredibly impatient but quietmed down once they were given their food and water.

Excellent questions were asked about the running of the farm, looking after the inhabitants and the different breeds of animals, some of which were unfamiliar to the students. Did you know that Kensington Palace was once the home of Queen Victoria, William III, Mary II, Queen Anne and Princess Diana? Just imagine getting the opportunity to wander through a palace; each room grander than the last. Picture being within touching distance of some of the crown jewels, tiaras and dresses worn by the peoples' princess! Fancy standing in the red saloon; the very same room that Queen Victoria held her first council meeting in just hours after discovering that she would be Queen at the tender age of eighteen! 35 Year 9 students had the rare opportunity to visit Kensington Palace and to meet with a historian who shared much about Queen Victoria's unhappy childhood. Students received a

unique insight into her life through diary entries and antique paintings; uncovering some of the secrets of the palace, which led into poetry writing from the perspective of a young Victoria.

Students used their detective and analytical skills to piece together a tale of a young princess, born at the palace to and Princess Victoria of Saxe-Coburg-Saalfeld and Prince Edward, Duke of Kent and Strathearn. They discovered a life of luxury that was overshadowed by loneliness and strict, unreasonable regulation imposed by a controlling and overbearing mother. They heard how at 6 a.m. on June 20, 1837, Victoria

was woken from her bed at and informed that her uncle, King William IV, had suffered a heart attack and died during the night making her Queen, less than a month after turning 18! They also discovered that although Victoria was born fifth in line to the throne (statistically being further from the throne than Prince Harry), the mortality rate at the time saw the death of her father and three uncles - who were ahead of her in succession. Having no legitimate heirs who survived childhood, Victoria not only became Queen but sat on the throne longer than any of her predecessors. 63 years... only being outdone by one other monarch; the current Queen Elizabeth II, who holds the title as longest reigning monarch after 67 years!

Terrific Tower of London!

This term, 35 Year 7 students took the journey into central London to dive into a bit of history at the Tower of London. We were greeted by a Norman knight (with a real sword!) who gave us insight into when and why the tower was built. Built by William the Conqueror, the tower has served a number of different purposes, from a prison to a royal residence. For a long time the tower was the tallest building in London. Once we finished the tour we had the opportunity to explore the grounds ourselves, we saw lots of armour and some weapons used in the 12th and 13th century. We were particularly taken aback by the gruesome torture methods used, which almost put us off our lunch! We ended the trip off with a stroll along the River Thames where we saw some of London's more modern iconic buildings. Students represented Woodside excellently as they navigated the city!





History at Hampton Court

35 Year 8 students were lucky enough to visit Hampton Court Palace this term as part of their investigation into the English religious reformation in History. As well as a tour of the palace, which included Henry VIII's private quarters, students explored primary evidence from the buildings of the palace and analysed the impact of changes in the monarch's religion in one of the key locations where religious and political decisions were made!
