GCSE Results

Woodside High School students have achieved strong results in this year's GCSE examinations with 69% of students achieving 5 GCSEs at grades 4+ including English and Maths and 43% at grades 5+ including English and Maths. Exceptional results include those by Patrica Ssonko (eleven grade 9s); Mohammad Hayen (six grade 9s and one grade 8), Ibtissam Ijouiher (six grade 9s, three grade 8s, and two grade 7s); Natalia Antova (four grade 9s, four grade 7s and three grade 8s), Jabiah Murshida (four grade 9s and six grade 8s), Tahir Ibis (four grade 9s, one grade 8 and three grade 7s), and Jerome Iyamu, who achieved four grade 9s.





With 70% of students achieving 5 or more 9-4 grades and progress for all learners well above average; Woodside students have once again demonstrated why Woodside High School is a fantastic place for students to study and learn.

Summer School

This summer, Woodside ran its first summer school for over 40% of its new Year 7 students. The current Year 8s were also invited with a large cohort of these students participating in a separate programme. So why the summer school? This year more than any, Woodside wanted to address some of those gaps that COVID has produced both academically and socially. The Government has actively encouraged schools to host such events in an effort to address a particularly challenging year in relation to transition. The research is overwhelmingly positive about the impact of summer schools. The NFER (the National Federation for Educational Research) found that most young people were worried about transferring to secondary school, 90% welcome the idea of being invited to summer schools, stating they found anxieties about starting secondary school were hugely reduced as a result of summer school. Attending a summer school has led to more positive attitudes (for confidence, socialisation and school readiness). Furthermore, the EFF (Educational Endowment Fund) who perform research into what makes an impact in schools, stated that summer schools can contribute to a +2 months of accelerated progress for students who attend.

The Woodside Summer School aimed to get the balance of academic and socialisation along with making memorable moments. For the most part, the teaching was delivered by our own staff to enable the students to have familiar faces when they arrived. Whilst there was a focus on Maths and English, other subjects such as History and languages were taught. Even simple things like using the canteen and navigating around buildings was aided by the students being in before other peers arrived. The creative subjects were also emphasised with students creating original pieces of work and participating in guitar and drumming workshops.

The week ended with a concert showcasing students' music, dance, drama, poetry and art. For many students this was the first public concert they appeared in or were part of in 18 months. Moving forward, the summer school will form part of the objective to aid transition in the most productive way possible, with the input of students in relation to what aspects they found to be of most use.

Ruben's Summer School Experience

In summer school, we did lots of fun lessons preparing us for what it will be like in the year ahead. A few of the things we did was drama, creative writing, dancing, music and so much more.

There were 8 classes in total, four Year 6 classes and four Year 7 classes. The Year 6 and 7 classes battled it out to see who could get the most Praise Points in the week.

The trips made the week extra special. We got to go bowling and cinema.

Activities were organised across the school to promote the importance of language learning, celebrate the languages spoken by Woodsiders and stimulate the students' love of languages.

During the day all teachers were encouraged to meet and greet pupils in any language they knew other than English to celebrate the diversity within Woodside. In tutor time pupils in each year group took part in their year group language quiz, competing against their peer tutor groups. In language lessons teachers delivered a series of games, including "guess the greeting", engaged pupils in activities to broaden their knowledge of European languages and develop their awareness of the importance of languages. They even understood the pitfalls of google translate! Finally, they were set the challenge of learning to sign as a homework assignment.

In addition, the department ran a competition which involved students finding key information about celebrities, language roots and tongue twisters from information posted around the school.

Careers @ Moodside

It's been a busy Autumn term for the careers department here at Woodside. We've been running various workshops and events to give our pupils the opportunity to explore the different paths they can take once they complete their journey with us.

We started off the year with assemblies led by senior leaders from Haringey Sixth Form, LAE Tottenham and Woodhouse College.

In October, our annual Careers Fair welcomed a variety of colleges, sixth forms and apprenticeship providers to help our Year 10 and 11 students figure out what options are available after Woodside.

Charlize's Careers Fair Experience

I thought it was really good because it wasn't limited to just one genre of college, there were a range of post-16 options available, such as Army Careers, BTEC Colleges and Universities.

Our Discovery Series started with an A-level Psychology taster session with Ms Zambon from City of London Academy Highgate Hill.

We Year 11 students were offered a wonderful chance to delve deeper into the post-16 curriculum. This time it was with City of London Academy Highgate Hill's brilliant Ms Zambon, exploring the country's second most popular subject: Psychology.

Being one of the most interesting subjects, it's easy to see why so many people turned up, eager to have a go at answering the biggest question there is, why are humans the way we are? It was an amazing opportunity, run as a real lesson to give us a flavour of sixth form style study and acting as an introduction to a whole new area of interest to all who attended. Fun and enabling, full of friendly people and interesting ideas this taster session has, I'm sure, introduced a whole new generation of aspiring psychologists to the world.

Winter Festival

This year, Woodside has begun its first Winter Festival. Running over the last two weeks of term, the objective is to come together to celebrate and learn in different ways. Underpinning the programme has been a focus on social justice and community.

The Equalities Group have chosen two charities which they feel reflect the concerns of our students in Woodside, and they are running a pop up bakery and snack stall at lunchtime.

Further support for homelessness was also achieved through our staff Christmas jumper day, raising funds for charity, Shelter.

Across the school, students in all year groups collected for Haringey Food Bank. Haringey is in the top ten for the highest rates of child poverty in the UK and food banks are increasingly relied upon by many Haringey families. Between 1st April 2020 and 31st March 2021, food banks in the Trussell Trust's UK wide network distributed 2.5 million emergency food parcels to people in crisis, a 33% increase on the previous vear. 980,000 of these went to children. Compared to this time five years ago, need for food banks in the Trussell Trust network has increased by 128%. With each form contributing where they can, students are not only making a far reaching impact in relation to their donations, but they can also learn the impact they can make to the community they live in.



COVID restrictions has meant a large concert wasn't able to take place so the compromise was the Winter Fete after school. The main objective was to have some light-hearted events towards the end of term whilst raising money for the Woodside experience. The money raised will help reduce the cost of trips and experiences at Woodside.



Underpinning all winter festivities is about coming together to unite in shared values. The school Christmas dinner allows for students to take part in the tradition of a Christmas meal with crackers. We hope to come back next year bigger and further reaching.
