



Helpful Information for Talking to Children and Young People about the Kahramanmaras earthquake





We know that lots of members of the Enfield community are personally affected by the Kahramanmaras earthquake. It is very understandable for children and young people and their parents to be experiencing a range of emotions such as shock, worry, distress and anger. You might be wondering how much information to share with your children, how to answer their questions and how to help them with their feelings. It is also important to look after yourselves too. This leaflet has some suggestions on how to do this.

How much information should I share with my child or young person?

Children and young people are exposed to information from news outlets, social media and

- Adjust the amount of information, and the level of complexity, to your child's developmental level, so that they are not overwhelmed with information they can't yet understand.
- Be mindful of your children and be aware of what is on the television or radio when they are present.
- Try to limit how much time you spend listening/ watching the news and make sure you are taking breaks.
- Follow your child's lead. If your child does not want to talk about what has happened or does not seem interested, it is best to let them come to you when they are ready to talk.

British Science Week 2023 poster competition

Here's the lowdown on what the judges will be looking for:

Creativity in approach - Innovative angle on the content or creative interpretation of the theme

Content - Clear, accurate and informative about a STEM topic

Effective communication - presented and communicated in an engaging way

THE THEME: This year, the theme is **CONNECTIONS**.

Nearly all innovations in science, technology, engineering and maths are built on connections between people; two (or more) heads are better than one, after all!

But as well as exploring the importance and joy in connections between individual scientists, research groups and institutions, you could discover the different ways connections appear across all areas of science.

Evolution, for example, shows us the ways that animals, including humans, as well as well, plants and bacteria are all connected in a family tree stretching back millennia.

The connection between human actions and climate change could be a fantastic topic to explore in our poster competition. Or how about how atoms connect to form chemical bonds which make up everything around us. The human body is another topic that offers a plethora of opportunities to think about connections, e.g. how organs are connected.

Perhaps you could explore the science and technology behind the internet or delve into the ways technology has changed the world by connecting people internationally at the click at a button.
