



Keep It Simple

Teach the Signal

Make sure students know:

- What the invacuation signal sounds like
- That they should stay where they are and listen

Practice Calmly

- Walk them through the steps
- Remind them: "I'm here to keep you safe."

Set Expectations

Students should:

- Stay quiet
- Follow your lead
- Stay in the room until told otherwise

Support Vulnerable Students

- Be aware of those with anxiety or SEND
- Use calm voices, simple instructions, and reassurance

MAW Library announces exciting updates and competitions

This week's Values in Action Hands Off Policy

You can support your child by:

Explain the Rule

Talk to your child about why the "hands-off" rule exists. Emphasise that it is about keeping everyone safe, avoiding fights, and respecting personal space. Explain that following this rule helps everyone feel comfortable and prevents misunderstandings or accidents. Use real-life examples, like what could happen if someone pushes or shoves in a crowded corridor.

Be Clear About What "Hands-Off" Means

Make sure your child understands exactly what is not allowed. This includes pushing, play-fighting, hugging, or any unwanted touching, even with friends. Be explicit that consent matters and that even well-meaning actions can make others uncomfortable. You might give examples of situations at school and ask your child what they think is acceptable.

Teach Boundaries and Respect

Discuss the concepts of personal space and consent. Help your child understand that they have the right to say "no" and that others have the same right. Encourage them to listen to friends and peers and respect their choices. You could also talk about body language cues, like when someone steps back or avoids contact, as a signal to respect boundaries.

Practice Situations

Role-playing can help your child feel confident in handling tricky situations. Act out scenarios where someone is being too physical or touching them without permission, and practice different responses—walking away, asking politely for space, or seeking an adult. This gives them a clear plan of action and reduces anxiety if it happens at school.

Know the School Rules

Go through the school's behaviour policy together so your child knows what is expected. Encourage them to ask questions if anything is unclear. Maintaining open communication with teachers and staff ensures that you and the school are on the same page and that your child receives consistent guidance.

Read the school's behaviour policy together and stay in touch with staff if unsure.







