

ATTENDANCE TOP TIP FOR PARENTS

Recognising effort makes a big difference. Praise your child's good attendance and punctuality at home. A sticker chart, kind words, or a small treat can help them feel proud. When attendance is celebrated, children are motivated to keep up their good habits.



ARE YOU WORRIED ABOUT SOMETHING

A worry is a concern. People you can talk to:



Good friendships help kids feel safe, supported, and accepted -qualities like kindness, trust, and fairness are key. Talk to your child about what makes a good friend and how to handle peer pressure. Let them know it's okay to say no or walk away if a group's behavior feels wrong. Practice simple ways to speak up or leave politely, like saying, "I'm not okay with this— I'm going to do something else." Encourage them to choose friends who make them feel good and remind them they can always come to you for support.


Stay Positive

Show Respect




Study spaces

Film Director

Directors are integral to the success of any film project, playing a central role in shaping the creative vision and narrative and bringing together all artistic elements to form a cohesive final product. During production, a typical day is between 10 and 12 hours. However, as a director you will usually spend extra time in meetings discussing aspects of the production.
