How these beliefs shape identity, moral choices, and community life. How Sikh values are represented in contemporary media.</p> <p>Buddhism: Life of the Buddha, the Four Noble Truths, the Eightfold Path, meditation, and ethical teachings. How Buddhist beliefs and practices guide behaviour and support community cohesion. Media examples of Buddhism in contemporary society.</p> <p>Examining how Sikh and Buddhist beliefs and practices shape moral understanding, identity, and community. How these influence identity, behaviour, and moral decision-making. Media examples of Hindu beliefs and practices.</p> <p>Judaism: Beliefs, Torah, mitzvot, festivals, and traditions. How Jewish teachings shape personal and community life, and moral reasoning. Contemporary media examples illustrating Jewish practice and values.</p> <p>Examining how Hindu and Jewish beliefs and practices shape identity, community, and moral understanding. How religion and ethical issues are represented in the media.</p> <p>Humanism: Humanism as a secular ethical worldview, including reason, compassion, responsibility, and moral decision-making without religion. Responses to contemporary ethical dilemmas as portrayed in the news.</p> <p>Overall / Summary: Examining how philosophical ideas, religious experiences, and secular ethical frameworks influence moral reasoning, beliefs, and behaviour. 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<p>YEAR 9</p>	<p>Studying World Views</p> <p>What is a worldview? What is your worldview? How do different people describe theirs? This unit explores worldviews through practical activities, metaphors, and case studies, integrating religious studies and sociology to investigate religion and belief in contemporary Britain. Students engage with data, interviews, and theoretical frameworks to understand how beliefs shape human experience and behaviour.</p> <p>Evaluating how worldviews influence thought, morality, and social attitudes. Expressing personal worldviews and engaging with differing perspectives. Using case studies, data, and interviews to develop GCSE-style analysis and reasoning.</p> <p>Skills:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Analysing and comparing different worldviews, including religious and non-religious perspectives Explaining influences on human experience and behaviour Interpreting case studies and sources to support academic understanding Reflecting on personal beliefs and values in a structured, evaluative way 	<p>Religion and the Environment</p> <p>How do theological and scientific perspectives differ and relate? Students explore faith-based and secular approaches to environmental issues, including creation stories from Christianity and Islam, and consider ethical responsibility through interactive activities and case studies. Environmental charities, media examples, and contemporary debates are used to enrich understanding.</p> <p>Examining how religious and non-religious beliefs influence moral reasoning and ecological responsibility. How do media and contemporary examples reflect diversity within Muslim communities?</p> <p>Analysing unity and diversity within and between Christian and Muslim communities. Linking theology with lived experience, social context, and ethical reasoning.
